THE IMPORTANCE OF PRAISING GOD

From the Pastor's Desk

Spontaneous Praise to God

Isaiah 25:1:

"O Lord, You are my God;

I will exalt You, I will give thanks to Your name; For You have worked wonders,

Plans formed long ago, with perfect faithfulness." (NASB)

These were the words that greeted me first thing one morning this past week as I began my Bible study. I read them and was immediately caught in the realization I was not ready for them. Why? Because, the spontaneity of Isaiah's praise to God came forth so forcefully to my eyes that I was not truly ready to do the same.

Up to this point in his book, Isaiah had been dealing with prophecy after prophecy of impending doom and gloom for Israel. In addition, he was faced with the realization that the people of God would not listen to his message and that in the end their destruction was imminent. Honestly this seemed like the last place Isaiah would burst forth with spontaneous praise.

So how could Isaiah, who faced such great opposition and pain from the Israelites, take a moment to spontaneously praise God? Well if one looks directly at the words it is easy to see.

First, Isaiah declared that the God of Israel is his God. His God was not the gods of the surrounding nations, or the gods that crept into the land and nation of Israel, or the idols fashioned by his neighbors whose destruction were assured. At one time for Isaiah they were his gods. Instead, for Isaiah, it was the God who created all things, and called all things into being, who reigns over all things, and is sovereign over all things that he declared as His God.

It was God who called him out of the surrounding idolatry of the nation that revealed Himself and purified Isaiah for the work of a prophet. That is why Isaiah praised God, for God delivered him from a path of destruction, the very destruction he saw in the prophecy God called him to declare to others. Thus this motivated Isaiah to exalt the name of God and give thanks for all that He has done.

Second, Isaiah spontaneously praised God because God revealed His plans to Isaiah, plans that were not formed out

of anger, or out of retreat, or from reaction to what Israel had done. No, God's wonders and activity are borne out of His sovereign rule and predestination. They are works of His that He carefully guided and directed in spite of man's sinful behavior and rejection of Him.

Isaiah recognized that God is not surprised by what man does, or thwarted by man's activities that were against Him, or derailed by man's attempt to take control. Instead, Isaiah acknowledged that God was sovereign, that He had called the Israelites as a nation unto Himself, and because He did so, He would work out His plans with great covenantal faithfulness.

Isaiah recognized that this was a blessing in the midst of punishment, because God's punishment would only go so far based on His love for His people. Thus the prophet spontaneously praised his God in the middle of much declaration of woe for the covenantal people.

Though this story is set almost three thousand years ago, we can learn a lot from this passage. The greatest thing to learn is to spontaneously praise our God and Creator, for our acknowledgement of His faithfulness points primarily to our Savior Jesus Christ.

Oh, how much God has done for us and how much He has lavished His love upon us. For He is God and He is worthy to be praised. Have you spontaneously praised God recently in the midst of pain or pleasure?

Isaiah teaches us in this passage that such praise does not come from focusing on ourselves, on our predicaments, or our problems; but instead on His majesty, glory, and greatness. Christ has done so much for us, shall we not praise Him for all He has done?

Let me encourage you today to take a moment and consider the importance of spontaneously praising our God and Savior for being who He is. Let us exalt His name and declare how awesome is His majesty. When we do break out in spontaneous praise, we fulfill our utmost for His highest, for we do that which we were created for, that is, to praise our Maker for who He is.

A new spreader will cost about \$700.00. The cost to get the drive salted and sanded by a vendor would be about \$125 for each storm, so a spreader will be much more cost effective and pay for itself in one winter. Let's think about how we can meet this need.

Look for a Fall Clean-Up Day near the end of October. Hopefully the leaves will be down by then and we can do all those indoor and outdoor things necessary to get the church ready for the "W" word.

Mary enjoyed her midweek church group meeting when she and several friends gathered to pray, worship, and discuss questions from the previous week's sermon. This week they were going to talk about the difference between "going" to church and "being" the church in a hurting world. She was looking forward to seeing her friends and having a lively discussion.

As she picked up her car keys, the doorbell rang. "I'm so sorry to bother you," said her neighbor, Sue, "but are you free this morning?" Mary was about to say that she was going out when Sue continued, "I have to take my car to the repair shop. Normally I would walk or cycle home, but I've hurt my back and can't do either at the moment." Mary hesitated for a heartbeat and then smiled. "Of course," she said.

Mary knew her neighbor only by sight. But as she drove her home, she learned about Sue's husband's battle with dementia and the utter exhaustion that being a caregiver can bring with it. She listened, sympathized, and promised to pray. She offered to help in any way she could.

Mary didn't get to church that morning to talk about sharing her faith. Instead she took a little bit of Jesus' love to her neighbor who was in a difficult situation.

Lord, help me to be ready at any time to be Your hands and feet to those in need.

Luke 10:30-37:

30 In reply Jesus said: "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, when he was attacked by robbers. They stripped him of his clothes, beat him and went away, leaving him half dead. 31 A priest happened to be going down the same road, and when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. 32 So too, a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. 33 But a Samaritan, as he traveled, came where the man was; and when he saw him, he took pity on him. 34 He went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he

put the man on his own donkey, brought him to an inn and took care of him. 35 The next day he took out two denarii and gave them to the innkeeper. 'Look after him,' he said, 'and when I return, I will reimburse you for any extra expense you may have.'

36 "Which of these three do you think was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?"

37 The expert in the law replied, "The one who had mercy on him." Jesus told him, "Go and do likewise."

In Memoriam



Christopher Frascinella died on August 21 2015 following a long struggle with depression and addiction. He was 39 years old and committed suicide. He was brother to Nathan and Julieanne and our son.

We tell you this – suicide – because the cause of death doesn't define his life. All of us live a lifetime and die in an instant. And the life before someone dies, regardless of cause, should count for something.

We loved our son and love his memory. When the depression came, he was overwhelmed with a sadness that we never understood. His actions would become inappropriate, dangerous, sometimes in anger, and illegal. Family was important but even that wasn't enough.

He fell in love and found a young woman who became his life, and another family whom he loved and who loved him back. Ten years and a new home, a wedding planned, and even that wasn't enough, and he lost it all. So did we.

Chris was a good person; he didn't always do good things, but we can still say that Chris was a good person. Outgoing, gregarious, and hardworking, Chris was good to be around. He helped with chores, often without being asked. He took pride in his work. He loved to cook, though he mostly overcooked everything. Chris and Nathan took turns cooking dinner when it was too tiring for their Mom.

He loved our dogs, Cisco and Gizmo, and, along with his Dad and Nathan, would hike the woody trails or take them swimming in the river. He loved the dogs to the point of annoying them, but they were always excited to see him.

For several years, Chris helped his second family with volunteer work for the Special Olympics and participated in February's Penguin Plunge.

Depression and addiction are just as much diseases as cancer, heart attacks, and pneumonia. We shouldn't be ashamed. We shouldn't *not talk* about them. They change the ones we love and take them away. When I think about my son, Christopher, I think about all the good he was and the last time I hugged him and how he felt.

As much as we'd rather that suicide wasn't the end of the story, it doesn't mean it's not a good story.

Chris, we love you and miss you so much.
